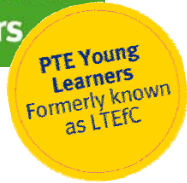

Pearson Test of English Young Learners

Basic Information about the Tests

The tests are offered at 4 levels, Firstwords, Springboard, Quickmarch and Breakthrough, and are designed to motivate young learners from their first encounters with English Language learning and to acknowledge their achievement.

The aim of the tests is primarily to test a learner's ability to use the language communicatively rather than to test their knowledge of the language system, although it is recognised that knowledge of the language system underpins communication. At all levels in the written test, learners are tested in their listening, reading and writing skills. There is also a speaking test, conducted by a trained examiner, in which learners participate in a board game and an individual activity.

As learners progress through the levels, there is growing emphasis on the scenario rather than on knowledge of specific language items and vocabulary.

Although the test is presented using British English, American English is acceptable. A knowledge of the Roman script is assumed at all levels.

Certificates are awarded for Pass, Merit and Distinction at each level.

The Brown Family

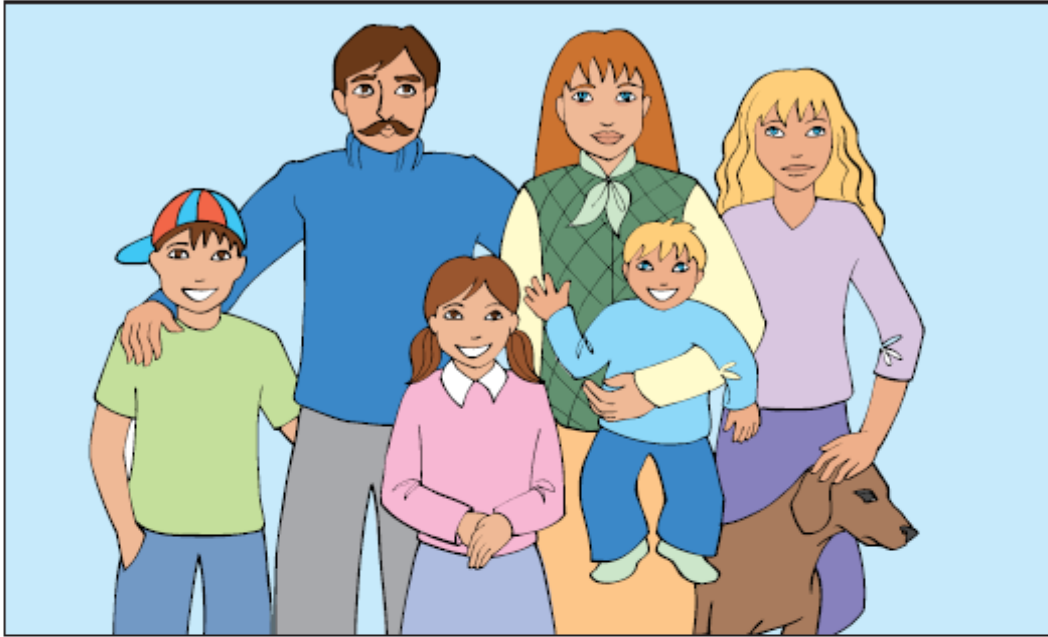
Throughout the four test levels, the learner will meet and share some of the everyday routines, adventures and mishaps of the Browns, a British family.

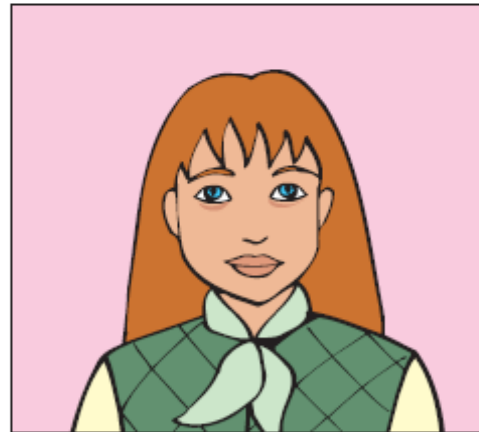

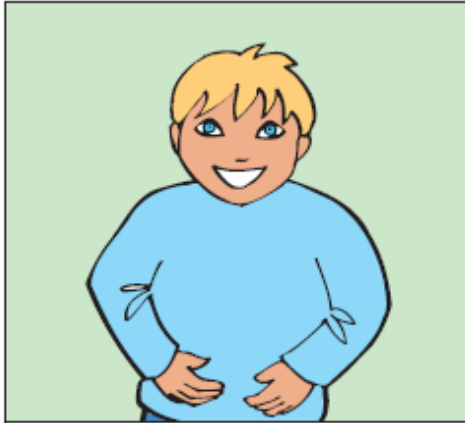

TEST FORMAT for BREAKTHROUGH

The BREAKTHROUGH written test consists of a one-hour fifteen minute paper which tests listening, reading and writing. There is also a separate speaking test.

Listening Tasks

30 Marks

There are two listening tasks. For each one, test takers listen to a short recorded passage and complete a task. Each passage is played twice. The following task types are used:

- multiple choice
- short written answers

Reading and Writing Tasks

50 Marks

There are four reading and writing tasks. The following task types are used:

- dialogue completion
- matching utterances and social situations
- filling in gaps in a text
- writing a narrative based on pictures

Speaking

20 Marks

Learners will be tested by participating in a board game activity and performing an individual activity.

Pre-Test Games

Young children are likely to find the exam situation stressful and may find it difficult to concentrate for the time needed to complete the test.

We therefore suggest that a relaxation period of 5-7 minutes should be taken, and should not be included in the time allowed for the exam.

The games suggested below, or similar games that the children know and enjoy may be played*.

Remember that this period should only take between 5-7 minutes. You can play the games suggested below or any other similar guessing game the test takers like doing.

FIRSTWORDS 'Guess what it is'

Draw a part of a picture. Ask the test takers to say what they think it is. Test takers are only allowed to ask YES/NO questions. After two or three questions, add a little more to the drawing until it is finished.

Suggested Options: school bag - car - plane - ruler

SPRINGBOARD 'Guess what I like eating'

Ask test takers to go to the front of the classroom. Whisper in the test taker's ear a word such as 'ice cream'. The rest of the test takers must guess what he/she likes eating by asking YES/NO questions.

Other options: spaghetti - bananas - salad - chicken

QUICKMARCH 'Going shopping'

Begin the game by modelling the first sentence, 'Yesterday I went shopping and I bought a book'. Student 1 then repeats this sentence and adds another object. The game is continued with each test taker repeating what has been said before and adding a new object each time. Finish the game when the chain is broken, i.e. when somebody does not remember what to say.

Note: If there are very few test takers in the group you may go back to the first test taker again and have a second round of sentences.

A Further Option: 'Yesterday I went to a party and I ate sandwiches'

BREAKTHROUGH 'Chain Story'

Begin the game by telling the class a sentence which is the beginning of a story, for example: 'It was a beautiful morning in September'. The next test taker continues the story by adding a second sentence. Then another test taker continues the story by adding a third sentence. The last test taker must round off the story with a happy or sad ending.

Note: If there are very few test takers in the group, you may go back to the first test taker again and have a second round of sentences before finishing the story.

A Further Option: 'I heard a very strange noise last night.'

Vocabulary Lists

Introduction

The following lists contain the vocabulary items used in each of the four levels of the Pearson Test of English Young Learners. The contents of examination papers, listening tasks and oral test materials will normally be limited to these items. Items not included in these lists may very occasionally occur in an examination but test takers will not be required to understand or recognise such items. In other words, they will not be tested on them. The lists do not include numbers or names of people or countries which may appear in the examination materials.

The items are listed in alphabetical order. The lists give root words only. That is, they do not include derived forms such as plurals or inflected verb forms. These should be assumed subject to the constraints of the language content syllabus for each level. For example, the verb *write* should be understood to include the forms *write*, *writes* and *writing* at Firstwords and Springboard and additionally *wrote* at Quickmarch and *written* at Breakthrough.
